

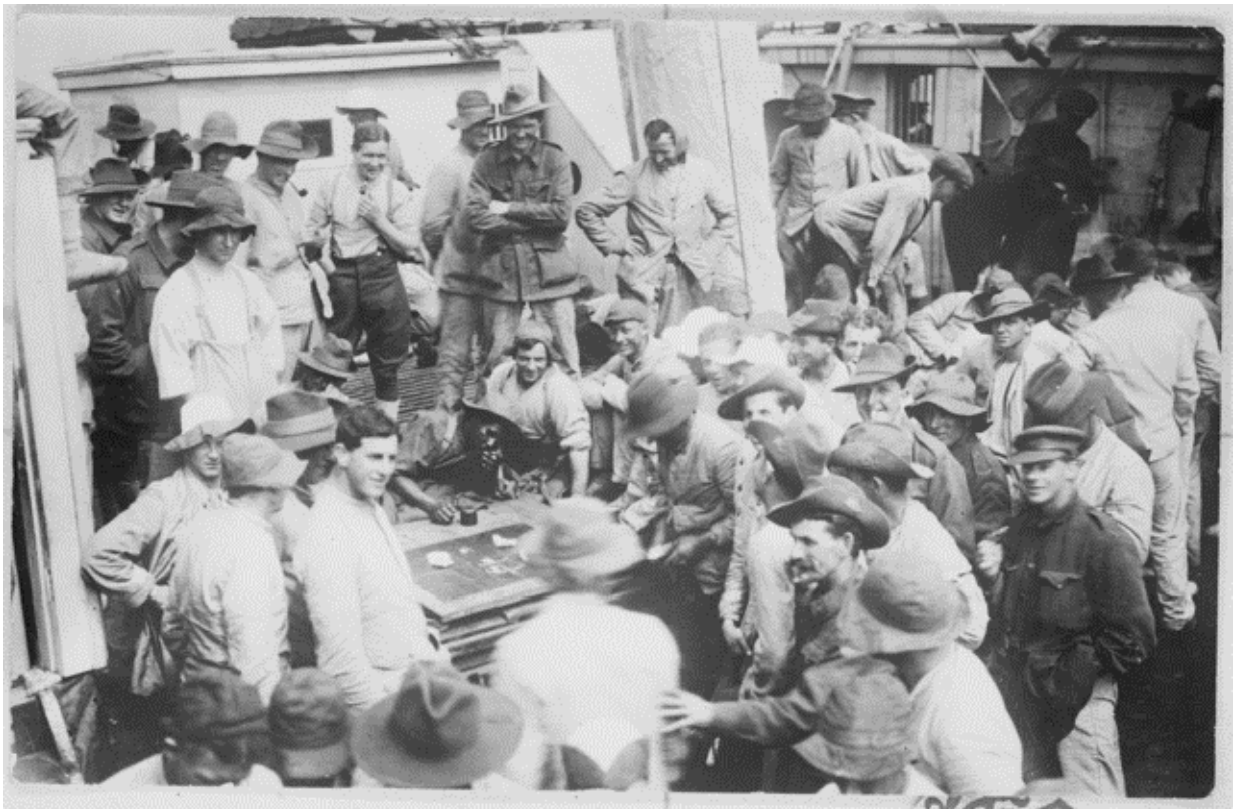
## Norman Albert MILLER

Norman Miller was born in 1875 to William Henry and Honoria Miller. Norman's grandfather founded the Bank of Victoria in 1850's.

Miller was a Trinity man at Melbourne University, and obtained his law degree in 1901. He was a keen sportsman and was billiards champion of the West Brighton Club in 1903. He completed his articles with Smith & Emmerton and, by 1917, was a principal in the firm of Fink, Best & Miller.

Norman Miller was to have the shortest of wars. He was 43 years old when he enlisted in June 1918. After the necessary training at Broadmeadows, he embarked on board the HMAT *Medic* on 2 November 1918. Days later, the ship was recalled when the armistice was signed, although the ship was quarantined for some days in Sydney due to a prolific presence of the influenza epidemic on board.

Miller returned to Fink, Best & Miller and, in 1920, he married Myrtle Florence Farrell. He had a long legal career with his firm and died in 1970, aged 94.
